- It is also important to remember that these lessons can be modified or removed if the committee and board would choose to do so. It is also important to note that this may affect the evidence-based fidelity of the material, as addressed under the Evaluation and Assessment section. The committee and board would need to determine if the priority is following the curricula exactly as it is developed or providing the material/lessons they determine to be most valuable to the culture/community within the schools.

Pedagogy and Teaching Methods

How has it been determined that your materials and teaching methods are age appropriate?

• As stated above in the "curriculum content" question, Prevent Child Abuse Vermont utilized curricula developers who are interdisciplinary experts in the field. From the list of professionals provided you can again see the expertise and education levels cover a very comprehensive range. This ensures the lessons contain age-appropriate information, and the corresponding material, teaching methods, and activities are age-appropriate as well. PPC utilizes the curriculum as recommended and permitted by PCAVT, ensuring the materials and teaching methods are age appropriate.

Training and Preparation

What training is required of facilitators?

• All staff that are employees of PPC Violence Free Network must complete an intensive 80+ hour training which encompasses all aspect of domestic violence, sexual assault, and other serious crimes. Staff are trained in core issues such as trauma, trauma responses and trauma informed care, advocacy skills, supportive counseling, crisis intervention, basic legal processes, and many other areas that impact survivors. Staff are also required to complete an additional 20 training hours each year. Staff who facilitate and present lessons from the Healthy Relationships Project attend training over the course of three days that is specific to the presentation of lessons and the information contained within the lessons. The training is provided by the Pennsylvania Coalition to Advance Respect (PCAR), formerly known as the Pennsylvania Coalition Against Rape. All presenters have participated in the Healthy Relationships Project Training-of-Trainers (HRP ToT) and have permission from Prevent Child Abuse Vermont to train PA sexual assault center staff. PPC also has a direct connection to the Director of Child Sexual Abuse Prevention Programs at Prevent Child Abuse Vermont for any additional needs and assistance.

Parent and Community Engagement

As presented, are the parent engagement components available for use by OCASD?

- PPC offers a presentation that provides information to caregivers on the Healthy Relationships Project, lesson information, how they can be an informed caregiver and be actively involved. Our program can work with the school to determine the best way to provide information to caregivers, whether it be an open-house format or an actual meeting/presentation.
 - We also have Parent Newsletters that provide details about each curriculum, tools to engage their child in conversation, and educational tidbits to expand their knowledge.

Evaluation and Assessment

How is collected data from pre/post-assessments used to evaluate the program?

- The evaluations of social emotional skills and protective factors of students Pre-K to 6th grade are to be conducted by someone at the school who knows the students well and has observed them regularly (classroom teacher or guidance counselor typically). Students in 7th and 8th grades do pretests prior to lessons and posttest afterward.
 - o The digital surveys in each case are housed at PCAVT.
- PCAVT does not recommend that evaluations be done when the curricula has not been offered in its entirety with fidelity (if lessons were skipped). If minor changes were made, it would still be appropriate to do the evaluations.
 - For example, if the curriculum committee felt that using same-sex names (Monica and Kara or Grant and Tyler) in relationship examples did not fit the needs/culture of the school the names can be adapted without affecting fidelity.
 - We may leave out an activity if it seems culturally inappropriate so long as the
 rest of the lesson is completed. If any single lesson is left out in its entirety, this
 would affect fidelity and would mean that you would not use the evaluations.
 - o Once the curriculum committee has made their decision regarding the curriculum and its lessons, we can discuss with PCAVT what will work best for the school.
- After the assessments are completed for the school, PCAVT can provide the school's specific data in chart format.
